



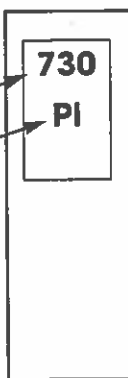

## Nonfiction Call Numbers

Nonfiction books have their own section of the library. They are about all different subjects, such as energy, outer space, people, and machines. Folktales, fairy tales, and poetry are all considered nonfiction.

Like a fiction book, a nonfiction book also has an "address" on its spine that helps you find it on the bookshelf. It is easy to tell the difference between a fiction and a nonfiction book because the nonfiction book has numbers as well as letters (fiction books just have letters). These numbers and letters make up its call number. The numbers on the spine of a nonfiction book are part of the Dewey Decimal Classification® system. This is a system of organizing books according to the subjects they are about. It begins with 000 and ends with 999. You will learn more about this system later in the book.

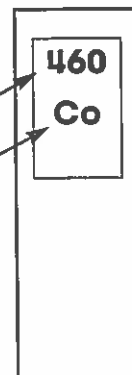
